#### Vets can now be checked for radiation

Veterans who attribute medical problems to nuclear radiation no have more access to Veterans Administration medical care.

VA administrator Harry N. Walters said radiation victims will be given the same consideration Vietnam veterans suspected of suffering from Agent Orangedisabilities might be accorded.

Government research into Agent Orange actually cleared the way for radiation victims to also be considered, Walters said. The government didn't want to favor one group suffering disabilities from chemicals to be favored over another.

The new guidelines say that each veteran who participated in the lesting of nuclear weapons, or who helped occupy Hiroshima or Nagasaki, Japan, shortly after atomic bombs were dropped there — between Sept. 11, 1945 and July 1, 1946 — will be provided a physical examination upon request.

Where the findings reveal a condition requiring treatment, a doctor will try to determine whether or not it was caused by radiation.

The same policy holds true for Agent Orange victims, Walters said

got quite a surprise the other day when I picked up my V.F.W. magazine and saw the name U.S.S. Calvert listed in it. Old memories came flooding back.. I was not only a passenger on your ship. I made my first beach head from it, and also helped build it in Sparrows Pt. Md. before I enlisted in the Marine Corps. I went aboard your ship Christmas Day 1943 in San Diego. I was one of the Marines of the 3rd. Battalion Landing Team 23rd. Regemental Combat Team, 4th. Marine Division. We were to sail to and land on Roi-namur Islands of the Marshall Islands. on Feb. 1,1944. We landed and captured Roi-Is. After three days we reembarked and set sail for Maui Hawaii. I was assigned to no. I hold and if you remember one of the boys fired a round into a salt water pipe and almost flooded the compartment. After we landed on Maui I never saw the Calvert again. I would love to know what happened to her after that. My outfit later hit Saipan then Tinian, then on to Iwo Jima. I was luckey and was not wounded until the Iwo landing. I was sent back to San Diego and the hospital there. After leaving the hospital in July I reported to N.O.B. Norfolk. I was discharged from there in Nov. If you have the time and feel like it I would appreciate an answer to this letter, describing what happened to you and the Calvert after I last saw her. Nevy Unit Commendation Awarded the U.S.S. CALVERT.

1. The Secretary of the Navy has awarded the U.S.S. CALVERT the Navy Unit Commendation for exceptionally meritorious service in action against enemy aircraft shore batteries, mines and submarines in both the European and Pacific Campaigns during the following operations:

The North African Occupation - November 8 to 11 1942;
The Sicilian Occupation - July 9 to 15, 1943;
The Gilbert Islands Operation - November 20 to December 2, 1943;
The Marshall Islands Operations - January 31 to February 8, 1944;
The Capture and Occupation of Saipan and Tinian - June 15 to July 28, 1944;
The Leyte Landings - October 20, 1944; November 18, 1944;
The Lingayen Gulf Landing - January 9, 1945.

By virtue of your service in the U.S.S. CALVERT during one or more of the periods cited, you are hereby authorized to wear as a part of your uniform, the appropriate Navy Unit Commendation ineignia.

The procedure to get one would be to write your request to the U.S. Senator for your state in Washington, D.C. Send a check made payable to "Keeper of the Stationery", the cost of which is \$7.27 for a 3' x 5' nylon flag. This price is so low, I was wondering if they made them in Taiwan.


