U. S. S. CALVERT (APA-32)

I wrote some years ago of my time aboard the Calvert, but I don't think I told the following of her history.

My three year enlistment was up on 13 Aug 50. A few weeks earlier, the end of July, Pres Truman extended everyone one year beyond their ETS. So, instead of three weeks to go, I had one year and three weeks to go. I was on an ATF in Newport, RI and I went home on a 15 day leave to Waite Park, MN. While on leave, I received a telegram from the Navy cutting my leave to only 13 days. Plus, I was transferred from the ATF to the USS Calvert and reported aboard her at Portsmouth, VA. I was an RM3.

What a "rust bucket" was APA-32. She had just been taken out of a nest of mothballed ships anchored in the Cheseapeake Bay. She had been nested there since the end of WW2. Still had camouflage paint and all internal equipment that was on her from the war. She went into drydock at Portsmouth where civilian workers replaced all radio equipment and all other obsolete intern. I components of the ship. They chipped and repainted the ship inside and out etc.

I believe it was late October 50 or November the 32 was taken out for her shakedown cruise and then "recommissioned" a ship of the Navy. We all became "plank owners" of the "new" Calvert. (Calvert distilleries donated a TV set (TV was rather rare in 1950), ash trays, and a few smaller items. All had on them, "To the men of distinction, of the USS Calvert"). Especially fitting, since most of the about 400 man crew were USN Reservists called back to active duty. We had about 30 Radiomen. Only three of us were Regular Navy. Me, RM3 Catteau, and RM Striker Cooper. Most of the USNR RM were 1st Class, one RM Chief (Vogler), and one RM2 (Rahn). Rahn was one of the USNRs that hadn't forgotten Morse Code. RM1 Moxley was another of the USNRs that remained qualified enough to stand RadioWatch.

In November '50 the Calvert went to San Diego where she met up with two other APAs. One was the USS Lenawee APA-131. We stayed there a few weeks. The end of November, the APAs, LSTs, and other smaller ships went to San Francisco where the California Nationa. Guard 40th Infantry Division, with all equipment loaded on to the ships.

Immediately after the troops were loaded, we sailed for our new home-port, Yokosuka, Japan. The convoy was designated Transport Division 13 of Task Force 90. Skipper of the 32 was Capt Hurd. APA-32 became flagship of TransDiv 13. Capt Hurd became Commodore Hurd, TransDiv Commander. (The Navy hasn't a one-star Admiral. Being wartime, the senior Captain becomes Commodore. So the Calvert flew a one-star Blue flag indicating she was flagship of Div 13).

A two-star Army General came aboard the Calvert when the 40th Div loaded at San Francisco. So the Calvert also flew a two-star Red flag. The army operations cente, with many VHF voice radios was located a amidship, above our radio room.

Off the coasts of Japan, we began practicing troop beach landing operations. LCVPs and LCMs etc. I was assigned to an LCVP "smoke boat" with an army portable radio. The radio was heavy and bulky. Especially, when crawling down the net into the LCVP with the rough seas causing the LCVP to rise and fall 20 or so feet.

In July, we went north to Hochinohe and Sendai where troops of the 40th Div were training for the soon-to-come landing in Korea. (My involuntary year extension was up and I left for discharge with Enginman 1st, Todd, from Macon, GA and another 1st Class who was manager of WMCAs in Baltimore). Discharged at Seattle on 7Aug51.

I got home to Waite Park about mid-night by train from St Paul. The next morning I went to the Legion bar. A soldier from St Cloud that was in the 40th Inf Div and whom I met just weeks earlier the day I left Sendai to go home, was sitting at the Legion bar! He beat me home. He had an arm in a sling. Just days after I had left the ship at Sendai the 40th Div took part in the Korean landing. He was wounded immediately. The hospitals in Japan were packed with wounded. Those not too badly wounded were flown home on convalesent leave instead of being hospitalized. (Some years later I learned that at age 32, he had fell off a barstool at the Waite Park Legion and died of a heart attack).

Roman P Weber, US Army Retr'd, MSG E8 1043 Stoneshire Drive Highlandville, MO 65669 I was on the Calvert from either late 1953 or early 195‡, until the summer of 1954. I was a Personnel Man (PN3). (later made it to PN1 while stationed at the USN&MCRTC in Columbus Ohio) At the time, on the Calvert, D.J Bainton, LTJG, was the Personnel Officer. I was transferred shortly before the ship sailed for WestPac to participate in the movement of civilians from north to south and south to north shortly after the French lost "French Indo-China." At that time, there were two PN3s on board and the ship received orders to transfer one PN3 for duty at the Receiving Station, Seattle. I was senior in grade and it was my option to go or stay. Panconi was the other PN3. I asked him what his preference was. He had never been to WestPac, and wanted to stay on the ship. I had made one trip on the USS Askari (ARL-30). I had no burning desire to return. Therefore, I took the transfer.

Most of the time I was on board, we were in various Yards in the San Francisco Bay area.

One of my most memorable memories of the Calvert was the rats we had on board. In fact, I left the ship shortly before it was moved to Treasure Island for fumigation. The crew was moved to barracks for several days while the fumigation was in progress. I remember watching movies in the mess hall. Periodically, there was a clattering of chairs as someone made a dive for a rat moving along a bulkhead. A bounty of one carton of cigarettes had been placed on each rat tail turned-in. As you may know, the Calvert was designed as a merchant ship and had most of its pipes and wires hidden by false overheads. That was a perfect hiding place for rats. I often wondered if the dead rats stunk-up the ship for sometime after the fumigation.

As I said earlier, I did serve on the Askari. Between the Askari and Calvert, I served on the USS Bellatrix (AKA-3) for about six months. It was home ported in Long Beach. It was one of the few diesel powered ships of its kind. Therefore we generally operated alone because most ships of its class were powered by steam turbines. We could not stay in formation, because we could not go as slow or as fast as other AKAs or APAs. A really bad situation for night maneuvers

I wish I had more to share, but my time on the Calvert was short.

I am a member of the Askari Association, and I serve as secretary. Along with my wife, we publish a news letter about four times a year. FYI, I am sending you a copy of that newsletter. You might note, we pirated an item from your newsletter. I hope you don't mind. Thanks again for the Calverson. I am looking forward to the next edition.


