

I served on this ship from September 1958 until February 1960 in a variety of positions including Assistant C/C officer, Signals Officer and Administration Officer. I reported aboard as an Ensign direct from NROTC, Univ. of Wisconsin, and departed as a LT(jg). Although I will probably not attend the reunion I'm interested in hearing about the status of others who have served aboard the Calvert. Allen Menke

Just a few lines to express my appreciation for the copies of the "Calversion", that you have sent me. I have thoroughly enjoyed reading them. I find myself reading them over and over. I was on the Calvert from 1950 until May of 1952. I boarded her in 1950 while she was still in mothballs. Evidently she had been recommissioned by early 1951 because I stumbled across an old photo album and log and noticed that at 0700 Saturday, February 17, 1951 we got underway from Norfolk, Va. enroute to San Diego, Ca. -the "log" indicates that we weighed anchor in Balboa, Panama on February 22, 1951. (I don't believe I'd want to drop anchor there now with the way Noriega & company are carrying on.) This was the beginning of the Voyage that carried us from Norfolk - San Diego - San Francisco - (Treasure Island) - where we picked up the 40th Infantry and carried them to the Far East. I believe that the picture of the Calvert coming into port, with the four Hawaiian maidens standing on the dock, was probably taken in April or early May of 1952 because it was about this time that we were returning from the Far East and stopped over at Pearl Harbor. I have one of the original pictures. If I remember correctly this picture appeared in the area newspaper. As I stated earlier I have enjoyed reading all issues of the Calversion that you have sent me as I see names of people that I think I remember, but Vol. #19 was a special "adrenalin pumper" because it contained the name and address of Robert Leroy Goodwin who was in the same division with me. I was able to call him up on the telephone. For the record I departed "The Good Ship Calvert in May of 1952 while she was anchored in San Diego Bay. Since that time I (after finishing college) have worked in the field of education as a teacher, coach and principal. Presently I am Principal of an elementary school here in Jackson, Tn. I am married and have three children (1 boy - Navy man of 10+ years & 2 daughters). The only trouble with the boy is that he chose to be an "air-dale" rather than a black shoe" sailor. 10-1-42 - On this date the USS Calvert was commissioned at Norfold, Va. (at first she was Apa-65, changed to APA 32 on Feb. 1, 1943). This was the start of a long career that would carry her thru WWII, Korean War & Vietnam War. 10-1-88 - A few years later (46 to be exact) thirty four former crew members and several guests gathered at Best Western Motel in Norfolk, Va. this was the mini-reunion. After a few landings at Coronado we left for Pearl and Yokosuka. We made so many practice landings at Chickasaki Beach we became known as the Chick a Saki Raiders. After a visit to Sendi on northern Hokido we left for Hong Kong for R & R. Then the Capt. gave us all our own coffee mugs. I still use mine every day for coffee. After we went back to Deigo for change of command and dry dock, but that's another story. I left the ship for Little Creek. At her helm I felt the strength and power of her engines as she sliced the water.


I had swabbed her deck and polished her brass and painted her bulkheads only because that was part of my job.



War medal pinned at last

GARY — Former U.S. Marine Ray Rybarczyk of Hammond received his second Purple Heart on Thursday — 39 years late.

Rybarczyk served in the South Pacific in World War II and was later called back in 1950 to serve in Korea, where he was wounded twice. The first time he received a Purple Heart in Korea was for wounds to both knees and both hands. His second battle wounds came in Korea at the Chosein Reservoir.

"We were at Chosein Reservoir, trapped." Rybarczyk said. "If anybody could walk they kept fighting. I had to be evacuated by helicopter because it was just too bad then. It was really a massacre. We landed with an outfit of 288 men. When I was evacuated there were only six men alive in our company."

Rybarczyk, who was wounded the second time in the neck and in his arms, was flown to the West coast then to hospitals in Springfield, Mass. and Portsmouth and Norfolk in Virginia.

"I was awarded the Silver and Bronze Stars in Korea," he said. "The Purple Heart kept following me but it never caught up."

When Rybarczyk, retired commander of the Calumet City Fire Department and now chief of security for Tradewinds in Gary, wrote to the Marines for past records, it was discovered that he had never actually received his second Purple Heart.

"Every once in a while these pop up." said Second Sgt. Steve Anderson of the Navy Marine Corps Reserve Center in Gary. "They'll find some obscure record. In military history when men are under strong attack there often isn't enough time for records."

Rybarczyk returned to the Reserve Center with family and friends to take part in the military ceremony. His last visit there was when it was his departure point for Korea. As a color guard stood at attention, retired Marine Corps Reserve Gen. Dean Sanglais presented Rybarczyk with his long-awaited award.

"He served with distinction," Sanglais said of Rybarczyk. "He typifies the American who's been asked to serve and serves well. Every day until the day he dies, Ray Rybarczyk will be a Marine through and through."

Rybarczyk and Sanglais had served together in World War II.

We've been friends for years and years and years." Rybarczyk said. "I asked that he be the man to give me my Purple Heart because many of the guys that were killed and wounded were friends of ours together and I have a personal feeling toward him. Marines have a kind of camaraderie that's pretty close and I think it's neat he gave me the decoration."

Rybarczyk said he plans to give his medals and Purple Hearts to his grandsons.




